Clare Valley Riesling Trail

The Clare Valley Riesling Trail is one of Australia's most popular and accessible walking and cycling trails.

Steeped in history, flanked by quiet townships and vineyards, blessed with stunning vistas and never far from delightful restaurants, cafes and cellar doors, the Riesling Trail is immensely enjoyable and totally free.

The Clare Valley's reputation for riesling inspired the naming of the Riesling Trail; a multi-use recreational trail for walking and cycling, which presently utilises 25 kilometre of a disused section of a former railway line connecting the townships of Auburn, Leasingham, Watervale, Penwortham, Sevenhill and Clare. The trail is now an integral segment of the 800 kilometre Mawson Trail and provides a wonderful opportunity to discover and experience the townships, soak up the history of the Clare Valley and enjoy the grandeur of its unique, unspoilt rural landscape.

Trail Loops

Users of the trail need not travel its full length in one attempt. Three 'Loop Trails' exist which allow users to return to their starting point without back tracking. Loop trails are sign posted and additional maps are available from local outlets.

Usage

Multi-use for walking and cycling, also ideal for both wheelchairs and pushers. Whilst the length of the Trail can be cycled in approximately two hours, the experience will be enhanced by completing the trip in stages (via the Loop Trails) and visiting attractions along the way.

Terrain

Picturesque countryside with spectacular views of the valley's vineyards and rolling hillsides. A tranquil and very safe thoroughfare with a gentle gradient.

Seasons

Suitable for year round usage, but summer months may need caution during days of extreme temperatures.

Signage

Markers are in place along the trail indicating direction and distance, points of special interest and 'Loop Trails'.

Car Parking

Trail side car parking is available at four key locations: Clare, Sevenhill, Watervale and Auburn.

Seafood & Aquaculture Trail

Savour, discover and enjoy the fresh seafood of the Eyre Peninsula on Australia's Seafood and Aquaculture Trail.

The Trail brings together seafood, dining and aquaculture experiences to help you chart the journey of our delicious seafood from the sea to restaurant plates.

See Southern Bluefin Tuna that can be worth as much as \$5000 a fish on the Japanese market. Watch seafood being farmed and processed. The industries included in the Trail vary from multi-million dollar operations to small experimental breeding programs and family-run businesses. There are 12 tours available, stretching from Whyalla to Ceduna along the pristine coastline of Eyre Peninsula.

Taste oysters, smoked and pickled fish or shellfish. Buy fresh ocean catch after your tours. And stop at coastal eateries to enjoy delicious menus and sea views.

The Eyre Peninsula produces more than 60 per cent of South Australia's seafood.

Barossa Food Trails

Butcher, Baker, Winemaker Trail

Barossa has arguably Australia's only true regional cuisine and you can discover the Barossa's thriving and distinctive food and wine culture on the Butcher, Baker Winemaker Trail.

The first of its kind established in South Australia, the trail leads to local wineries, dining venues and businesses that offer intimate food and wine experiences and incorporate products made with traditional methods and ingredients. You can also visit retailers and artisans, join specialist tours and enjoy complimentary experiences that have a gourmet theme.

Barossa Cheese and Wine Trail

Linger longer and enjoy a fabulous wine and food-matching experience. Purchase a Barossa-branded cooler bag containing a cheese knife, a small cheeseboard made from old oak barrels, four locally made cheeses and crackers, and a trail map.

There are six routes to follow, each one including five wineries within close vicinity to each other. When you arrive at each cellar door, make your wine tasting selection and match it to a cheese from the cooler bag - a great way to make wine selections to take home and share with friends and family. Para Road Wine Path

If you want to mix walking and wine, stroll along the Para Road Wine Path. This trail links four of Tanunda's cellar doors - Stanley Lambert, Richmond Grove, Peter Lehmann Wines and Langmeil Winery - winding its way alongside the historic Para River and vineyards, some over 160 years old. Each November these cellar doors unveil a great new Barossa wine accompanied by delicious food, light unobtrusive music and other surprises at the Para Road Wine Path day.

Good Food & Wine Trails

Kangaroo Island is enjoying a food and wine renaissance with a growing number of producers, farm gates, cellar doors and restaurants offering visitors and consumers a taste of KI!

Indulge for a day or two and experience the milking of sheep at the Island Pure dairy, sample Clifford's famous honey ice cream and pick out your own lobster direct from the Ferguson family's fishing depot. Take in a jaw-dropping ocean views that are equally matched with stunning local produce platters and wine pairings at Dudley Wines or Sunset Winery cellar doors.

Stop for lunch at Stokes Bay's Rockpool cafe and enjoy a glass of KI wine and a platter of seafood or fresh water marron. Local produce is featured on menus across the Island, from all day breakfast menus through to lunch and dinner.
